



The Power of Themed Meetings

In the history of Club meetings, many an attendee has walked into a meeting with only a vague idea of what the club intends to achieve via the event. Oftentimes the agenda hasn't been reviewed and a sense of requirement to be there replaces the sense of truly being inspired by the opportunities and ideas that can come out of a fun and successful meeting.

Today I want to expand on my discussion at the District Gathering of running 'themed' meetings and some of the benefits that may come out of them for your club. When a theme is identified, attendees walk into it with a clearer sense of being an active participating member and the thinking behind the club as valuing their members time as they give back to their communities. And they can get that message in advance or immediately upon entering the room which in turn prepares their mindset to do even more great things.

Lions International is encouraging the YOUR CLUB YOUR WAY mindset. They are not stating how to do it but giving clubs leeway to explore what works best for them – which is YOU.

Some themes are designed to motivate attendees themselves to make an impact, such as "The Power of One: Ignite, Inspire, Impact." Just ASK programs. These focus on the individual's ability to impact those they encounter as a 1:1 relationship and the reality is it is something we can do in any social situation if we have the confidence in ourselves and a belief in the organization we represent.

Other themes are involving the entire club and with a little thought and brainstorming - the possibilities are endless. "Your Club, Your Way". Allowing members to build on a theme in their own way can showcase members creativity and club possibilities. Themes can also create a buzz **prior** to the event as guests discuss how they can interpret the theme, what they are going to go as, what their friends are trying and whether they can do joint costumes which can be great corporate team building. Regardless of the event type, there is a theme to transform your event, improve user experience and only make the whole thing better.

It's understandable that clubs can run out of engaging club meeting ideas at some point. After all, it's the same type of session, with the same people and often at the same time every week or month. But team meetings don't have to be dull and repetitive. In fact, if your meetings are, then you may need to act urgently to get your clubs motivation and engagement back on track.

We have all been involved in holiday themed events with New Year, Valentines, Easter, July 4th, Thanksgiving and Christmas events, but thinking outside the box, we could consider ideas such as Mardi-Gras, Olympics, Superbowl, Crazy Hat, Neon, 80's (or any decade), Movie themes, back to school, Anniversary of Club year, Destination themed, Hollywood awards, Hippy 60's, - The options are almost limitless. Or how about food themed – chili cook off, death by chocolate, cupcakes, deserts, pizza, how about a location change - summer picnic, luau meeting by the pool, snowy retreat.

Membership success is about meeting your current team where and supporting those in the club as well as building those new to the club life and making it a place they want to share with others. If we are always doing the same thing there is little need to talk about it but if we are having fun while we are serving, then others will see this is something to be a part of. Please reach out if you need more ideas and we will happily send you a list of ideas to think about that others have used and enjoyed.



Historical Notes from 1968

'What Lions Are Not'

Fifty years after the first Convention in Dallas, Edward M. Lindsay, the Golden Anniversary President of Lions International, realized that the best way to define Lionism was to explain what it was not. In an address delivered to the annual U. S. State Department Foreign Policy Conference for Nongovernmental Organizations, President Lindsey said.

We are not a political organization, yet among our members will be found leaders of all political parties and factions. Our Constitution prohibits activity in a partisan political way, yet it carries a positive mandate that each club should provide a forum for the free and open discussion of all matters of public interest.

We are not a social club, yet we are directed to take an active interest in the social welfare of our various communities, for only in this way can we realize the full potential of our influence in developing the moral fiber of our societies.

We are not a fraternal organization, yet we have found that men of all faiths, all religions, all nationalities, all races can come together in an aura of mutual understanding, resulting in strong bonds of friendship and good fellowship.

We are not a youth organization, yet Lions Clubs sponsor more Boy Scout troops than any other organization. We participate in so many youth programs and projects in this nation and abroad that it is hard to determine if the dog is wagging the tail or the tail is wagging the dog.

We are not a welfare organization, yet over the years, in good times and bad, countless thousands of less fortunate people have been the recipients of the generosity of Lions. Whenever human suffering has been found, the flexible purposes of Lionism have made it easy for Lions to respond generously and with open hearts.

We are not a sports or recreational agency, yet thousands of boys have been thrilled with Little League programs and many other activities built around the training of the minds and bodies of our youth, both boy and girls.

We are not a religious body, yet the precepts we live by are familiar to the doctrines of the world's spiritual bodies, and the motivation of our activity, resulting in thousands of complete projects, is deeply rooted on the age-old philosophy of "Love Thy Neighbor," found in some form or another in the dogmas of all religions.

We are not a medical or health organization, yet our clubs have performed miracles in this wide panorama of community and individual service.

We are not an educational foundation, yet thousands of students are today in schools built by Lions. In Mexico, for example, almost a thousand public schools have been built and equipped by Lions.

And there is another thing we are not: we are not a United Nations. Yet we are an instrument of peace. Lionism, born while the world was aflame, has grown strong under the nourishment of freedom and liberty, and the effort for peace which we intend to make will be directed along those traditional concepts, for we believe that there can be no meaningful freedom without peace and no lasting peace without freedom.

Some fainthearted ones may say, "Why are you doing this? Why do you think Lions International should attack this problem when even great and powerful nations have failed through the ages?" Our answer is simply this: "We are not so naïve, so immature, as to think our effort alone will unravel this tangled mess, but we are confident we must make the effort. We must make our contribution, and so must you."

EARLY PLANNING IS THE KEY TO A SUCCESSFUL CONTEST

"Social Media: Connects Us or Isolates Us?" is the topic for this year's Student Speakers Contest. Once again, the Council of Governors (COG) of Multiple District 4 of California have selected a timely topic for the high school students of California to speak on.

If your Club is even thinking about putting on a Student Speakers Contest, they should go ahead and order a Student Speakers Contest packet as there is no charge for the packet if ordered by the October 1 st deadline. After that time, there will be a \$25.00 fee to the individual Club. It should also be noted that all the materials in the packet will be available online, but you will need to print them out.

I anticipate that Clubs will receive their individual packets sometime in November, but it is never too early to start the buzz for the Contest with high schoolers in your area. Those Clubs that have already had years of successful Contests already know how to find students and judges for their Contests. For those Clubs that are new to having a Contest, assign a contest chairperson and start planning early, although the deadline for completing the Club Contest is

usually the third Monday in February. Start talking to school officials, individual teachers, Speech and Debate coaches, Mock Trial advisors, home-school program administrators.

Set a date for your Club Contest and post some preliminary information up on your Club's Facebook page and/or website. If your city has a Facebook "Talk" page, put the information on there. The app NextDoor may be a good place to post it as well. You may want to place it in the community news section of your local newspaper. I am certain there are other creative methods of advertising this Contest and getting the word out to the public.

Your Club also needs to find a minimum of three judges that are not Lions or related to a Lion to judge the Contest. Your local Toastmasters Club members are one source of judges. Local public officials, attorneys, college professors, teachers are all great sources for judges.

Personally, I always like to seek an individual that may have a vested interest in the topic, so in this case, someone who works in the social media industry or does marketing on social media may a great judge.

BENEFIT STATEMENT

How California Lions Foundation (CLF) Benefits California Clubs and Districts

The California Lions Foundation (CLF) matching grants are available in smaller dollar amounts, \$500-\$7,500, for projects that do not qualify for support from other foundations or to complement grants already available from other foundations (e.g. LCIF). CLF provides matching grants with a very streamlined review and approval process

CLF is able to aid in disasters that are not "natural disasters". In 2014, a fire destroyed the food delivery trucks at the Monterey County Foodbank. The fire was determined to be arson, not a natural disaster and as a result, the local Lions were not able to get assistance from LCIF.

CLF offers special recognition for Club and Individual/Corporate donations. Lions may become a a Kay Fukushima Fellow for a minimum donation of \$1,000 or a Reginald Harris Fellow for a minimum donation of \$2,500.

100% of All Donations Received Serve Californians Through California Lions clubs.

CLF ensures that 100% of donations are put to work to provide service to California communities. CLF can also partner with local Lions Clubs that do not have a 501(c)(3) designation. CLF is able to accept donations from individuals, businesses or corporations that are meant for use by a Lions Club that does not have a 501(c)(3) designation. Any designated donation such as this requires prior approval by CLF.

CLF accepts donations of stocks/bonds of publicly traded companies. This provides a means for the donation of appreciated stocks and bonds whereby the donor receives a tax deduction for the full value of the donated item without having to pay any capital gains tax on the appreciated value.

CLF will accept donations of cars, boats and recreational vehicles.

CLF will accept donations through Planned Giving such as charitable remainder trust, charitable lead trust, real estate, and beneficiary designation from retirement plans and life insurance. Any proposed real estate donation must be reviewed by CLF prior to acceptance.

LIONS UNIVERSITY - USA-CANADA Lions Leadership Forum





It is a Comprehensive Lions Club Leader Development Program available to **every** Lion club member! Classes are on-line, self-paced year-round and only take about one hour each to complete.

Each class has a short knowledge quiz at end to assess understanding and once completed you will receive a certificate of completion.

To be awarded a Bachelors, Masters or Doctorate in Lions University, Lions must complete 10 required courses and at least 5 electives of their choosing. Once these classes are complete you can apply for graduation! Easy!

To receive your diploma, you must then personally attend one of the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forums that are held annually. **The good news is the 2023 Forum will be held in Reno, Nevada!!** So, if we can get several club members from our district to complete this interesting training over the next year maybe we can travel together to this and have a graduating 4L5 class celebration!!!!

Bachelor's Program: This program allows Lions to develop the skills necessary to lead a vital Lions Club. Courses are directed to the skills needed to be a great club leader.

Master's Program: This program focuses on giving support to clubs through district leaders. This program is aimed at District Level Leaders - District Governors, Vice District Governors, Zone Chairs, District Committee Chairs, Certified Guiding Lions, and other leaders that are ready to foster quality clubs in their District.

Doctorate Program: This program focuses on skills needed to be a training facilitator for adult volunteers. In effect, Lions who have completed the Doctorate Program are prepared to be great trainers of other Lions.

The photos will be displayed, and the winners will be selected by popular vote at the MD4 Convention in February 2023. There will be one winner in each category.



Section 8:Candidacy Requirements for Second Vice District Governor: A candidate for the office of second vice district governor shall: (a) Be an active member in good standing of a chartered Lions club in good standing in this district. (b) Have served or will have served at the time he/she takes office as second vice district governor: (1) As president of a Lions club for a full term or major portion thereof, and a member of the board of directors of a Lions club for no less than two (2) additional years; and (2) As zone chairperson or region chairperson or cabinet secretary and/or treasurer for a full term or major portion thereof. (3) With none of the above being accomplished concurrently. (c) Announce his/her candidacy by means of a letter signed by the president of his/ her Club with the approval of the board of directors of the Club, or a majority of the clubs in the district, and sent to each Club in the district, and each member of the nomination, elections and credentials committee, not before December 1st, but prior to March 1st, either by email or regular postal mail. (d) No second vice district governor may succeed himself or herself in office. Section 9:Second Vice District Governor Election (a) The second vice district governor election shall be conducted by a secret written ballot, with the second vice district governor candidate required to secure a majority of the votes cast by the delegates present and voting to be declared elected; for purpose of such election, a majority is defined as a number more than one-half of the total valid votes cast excluding blanks and abstentions (b) The second vice district governor shall serve a term of office of one year, which term shall begin with the close of the association's convention held in the year of their election and end at the close of the next convention of the association. (c) No second vice district governor may succeed himself or herself in office. (d) The result of each second vice district governor election shall be reported to the international office by the respective current district governor and/or international staff representative.
